You do this by...

This walk is the easiest walk that you will ever have to walk because all you have to do is follow the Spirit, do what is right, and trust your heavenly Father with the results. It is also the hardest walk that you will ever have to walk because all you have to do is follow the Spirit, do what is right, and trust your heavenly Father with the results.

The reason it is so hard is because you have to let go of control. We all want to know what is going on so that we can manipulate it to our advantage.

- Instead of waiting to see what the Spirit is wanting us to do we act out of fear or panic.
- Instead of doing what is right we try to complicate it by justifying our actions so that we are not put into a difficult situation or in some way hurt by the outcome.
- Instead of trusting a heavenly Father oh, we say that we trust God, but our actions give us away and show that we are really lying to ourselves instead, we want to take control and worry. It seems that we just can't find the peace or joy that true trusting brings. It is

true in a way that we do trust Him, as long as we are in control, and we may even trust Him with the things that we feel that are way out of our ability to control, but most of us simply don't trust Him enough to lay down our control and just rest in Him.

Many are called to walk the kingdom walk by following these three steps, but they are unable because of their pride and distrust of God as their heavenly Father. They put their eyes on so many other areas in their lives that they feel they can control, even though it is just an illusion of control, but they would rather have an illusion of control than take the chance of losing their lives and allow God to have control of the situation. In other words, many are called to walk in trust, but few chose to answer this call. Some do for a short time, but then as time passes, or other opportunities come up, they return to their old way of control.

What the true proverb says has happened to them: "The dog returns to its own vomit, and the sow, after washing herself, returns to wallow in the mire." 2 Peter 2:22 (ESV)

But for those who will lay down their control – their lives – and trust their heavenly Father, will find themselves entering into a journey in the kingdom of God that will allow you to experience the goodness of a heavenly Father who loved you so much that He doesn't hold anything back from you – not even His only son, Jesus of Nazareth.

Jesus told his disciples to have this attitude: "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his executioner's stake and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul?"

Yes – It's that simple...
